#### 2.2.2.1 Description of Coordination of Services for American Indian/Alaska Native Students

Jackson County Schools uses a variety of funding sources to meet the needs of American Indian students. The school with the largest number of American Indian students is a Title I school and also has the highest number of students identified as homeless. Students benefit from Title I funding and services for homeless students. Title I funds are used to reduce class size and to provide a lead teacher, both of which positively impact the educational experience of American Indian students; also Title I funds provide educational resources and materials to impact and enrich educational programming as well as teacher professional development. Additionally, Impact Aid funds are used to meet a variety of district needs including hiring teachers to lower class size, an effort that benefits American Indian students. The Title VI funds received by Jackson County Schools provides native Cherokee cultural enrichment programming, and a portion of the salary for a Reading Specialist, who works exclusively with students, dedicated specifically for the school with the highest number of American Indian students. Title VI funds will be used to provide cultural enrichment activities both brought into the school as well as through the local Cherokee Native American Museum. These activities may include traditional Cherokee music and dance, pottery-making, beadwork, Cherokee legends and folklore, Cherokee anthropology, and Cherokee history.

#### 2.2.5.1 Description of Meaningful Collaboration with Tribes

The local educational agency, along with district schools, collaborate with Indian tribal stakeholders including parents, community members, and business persons regarding the comprehensive programming for Indian Education. Jackson County Public School's administrators, in conjunction with the Indian Policies and Procedures (IPP) committee, will review school data and comments with tribal officials, Indian Education Parent committee, parents and staff regarding the assessment and extent of Indian students' participation and progress in the educational programs and services offered by the school system. The Indian Education Parent committee meets quarterly to discuss the academic progress of Indian students overall, provide feedback on the Indian education grant, and provide feedback and receive information about cultural awareness and enrichment activities. Additionally, general school updates, reading specialist updates and Cherokee cultural enrichment activity updates are shared in these meetings. The Indian Education Parent Committee purpose and objectives are to provide an avenue for program input, to collaborate on objectives of the Indian education program, and to encourage participation and involvement in the educational advancement of Indian students. Feedback from these meetings is garnered as input into the Indian Education Student Plan.

Culturally enriching activities to serve Indian students in the district will include field trips to authentic and culturally relevant Indian historical places, Indian culture projects integrated into the curriculum, Indian cultural programming brought into the schools, college and career readiness for Indian students, and project-based integrated cultural lessons and units. Funds for activities directly related to culture are proportionately assigned according to enrolled American Indian student population at the elementary and high school where they are served.
